Cheerful Service in Caroline Order Involvement Apparent at National Jamboree

The presence of the Order of the Arrow was greatly felt at the 2005 National Scout Jamboree. The Order was involved in three major events, namely the NESA/OA show 12³, two American Indian Dance Pow-Wows, and the American Indian Village at Merit Badge Midway.

The Order of the Arrow, in conjunction with the National Eagle Scout Association, put on Twelve Cubed. The show's purpose was to strengthen the values of the twelve points of the Scout Law, along with the three pillars of the Scout Oath. The concept of the show proved to the audience that nothing but the real experience of scouting can teach Scouting's principles to young men. Nawakwa Lodge had a strong presence in the Cast and Crew of Twelve Cubed: Ceremonialists Andrew Pridgen (as the lead, Brian), Jacob Scanlon (as Donovan), and Brandon Ray (as a Cubit) all starred in the show, while Tray Murphy, Ceremonial Team Adviser, worked on the TV/Video crew. We thank our fellow Nawakwa Arrowmen and the rest of the Arrowmen who worked on Twelve Cubed for a great show!

The OA Service Corps was a group of dedicated Arrowmen from all across the country who cheerfully served Scouting at the Jamboree. The Corps included over 150 Arrowmen who provided manpower and assistance to program and support areas at the jamboree. Their greatest accomplishment was organizing water

distribution during the arena show. Cases of water bottles were strategically placed all across the arena and water bottles were thrown to thirsty participants and visitors as the first supply ran out. Some of the other services that the Corps provided included: flag ceremonies, youth recreation, VIP guides, food service, and security.

The American Indian Village at Merit Badge Midway was made up of the top ten available dancers in each category of dance from the previous National Order of the Arrow Conference. The purpose of the village was to educate scouts about Native American Indian tribes from all around the country. A series of interactive exhibits explained customs, lifestyles, and activities associated with each region of American Indians. All of the exhibits included a model of a typical dwelling used by the groups of Indians and games played by youngsters to improve life skills. Traditional story-tellers and dancers gave visitors a sense of lifestyles and beliefs of the Indians. Another function of the Indian Village was to provide an opportunity for scouts to earn the Indian Lore Merit Badge in a more in-depth and thorough manner than usually possible. Scouts who were taking the Merit Badge had the opportunity to spend valuable time with counselors. many of whom are themselves American Indians who had experienced many of the things they were teaching for themselves.

On Tuesday and Friday night respectively, the Indian Village sponsored two Native American dance Pow-Wows. Both Pow-Wows had over fifty participants from all across the nation. There were dancers from all styles of Native American dance, including Straight, Old, Traditional, Grass, Fancy, and Hoop. The Pow-Wows opened with a Grand Entrance, in which all of the dancers slowly danced into the circle, and awaited the opening ceremony. The opening was followed by an explanation and an "exhibition" of each style of dance. Travis Sheehan was the lead dancer for both Pow-Wows and took part in the Fancy Dance Exhibition. In the middle of the Pow-Wow, the emcee called all of the audience in to the ring for a "Ring Dance". This is a traditional custom of dancers, and it was used to help families in need. At the Jamboree, however, it was used in order to raise money for the Maury Clancy Indian Campership Fund. This charity helps provide funds to those American Indian Scouts needing assistance to attend resident camp. Together, both Pow-Wows raised \$2660 for this worthy cause. On Scout said at the Friday Night Pow-Wow, "That was my last dollar, but I want and Indian kid to go to Summer Camp

The Outdoor Adventure Place (TOAP) at Jamboree was an interactive exhibit area detailing outdoor activities. There were an abundance of big ticket items in the TOAP area this year. The Leave No Trace area led by the National Forest Service and The Leave No Trace Organization consisted of hikes through the woods to discover clues and learn about the art of Leave No Trace camping. There were a plethora of obstacle courses that participants wound and weaved their way through. To add to the variety, there were numerous cooking demonstrations and hands on camp setups and activities. As always, the TOAP visitors got the opportunity to view the latest in camping gear.

The 2005 National Scout Jamboree was a great experience for both Arrowmen and Scouts alike, and it promises to be even better in 2010. See You at the Hill!

An Interview with Brad Nesheim, Scout Executive

New First Class Rank Requirement

Beginning January 1, 2006, an additional requirement will be added to the requirements for First Class rank in Boy Scouting. Scouts beginning their First Class requirement work after this date must complete the new requirement: "Tell someone who is eligible to join Boy Scouts, or an inactive Boy Scout, about your troop's activities. Invite him to a troop outing, activity, service project or meeting. Tell him how to join, or encourage the inactive Boy Scout to become active." Scouts working on First Class requirements prior to this date will have until June 30, 2006 to complete First Class rank without completing the new requirement.

Youth Members Are Getting Ripped-off!!

You are a youth member of the Order of the Arrow, and thus you are entitled to all rights and privileges of membership in your own lodge.

But consider this: you pay at least \$10 to register in your lodge, and the flaps cost you about \$4. What this means bluntly is that you may be getting *RIPPED OFF!!!*

Let me explain. Flaps are not the only way to benefit from your lodge. Listed below are some of the other ways a Scout can benefit.

- YOU are entitled to run for office either on the chapter or lodge level and help your lodge as you see fit.
- YOU are entitled to attend the Fall Fellowship and Banquet, the Section SR-7A Conclave, and the OA weekends out at camp.
- YOU are entitled to submit articles to this newsletter (it is yours after all). You even have a chance to publish and edit this newsletter as well.
- YOU are entitled to help your chapter decide what your chapter does and assist with or participate in those events.
- YOU are entitled to vote and voice your opinion on such things as dues and other lodge programs.
- YOU are entitled to attend the National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC) held every two years (next in 2006).
- YOU are even entitled the high honor of being an elangomat or assisting in any position during an Ordeal weekend.
- YOU are entitled to talk, work, share, learn, and experience with your brothers.
- YOU are entitled to seal your membership in the Order through the attainment of Brotherhood membership.
- YOU are entitled to and obligated to Cheerful Service to others.

Of all the rights and privileges listed above, how many are you participating in? Are you really getting your money's worth? And don't overlook that last one...Cheerful Service is what the Order of the Arrow is all about, and therein lies your greatest reward. So, now do you think that you're being **RIPPED OFF?**




