Schedule Changes & Additions

Council of Chiefs Makes Amendments to Printed Schedule

At the April 29th Council of Chiefs meeting, several changes to the Conclave schedule were approved with little dissent from the members.

There will be many The first was the approval of three additional training sessions related to Native American dance and culture. These are highlighted below.

Another changed was necessitated by a difficulty in obtaining independent judges for the ceremonies competitions. Due to the limited number of qualified judges at the Conclave this weekend, each lodge will be

providing two Vigil Honor members to serve as judges. In addition, it was necessary to move the Vigil Honor competition to the CTBS Chapel. These competitions are scheduled to begin promptly at 10:00 AM.

Other adjustments include a brief meeting of lodge chiefs at 8:45 AM outside of the CAC Dining Hall beside the Flag Plaza to discuss the rules for the afternoon competitions. Also added is a training meeting for lodge ceremonies competition judges at 9:00 AM in the CAC Dining Hall.

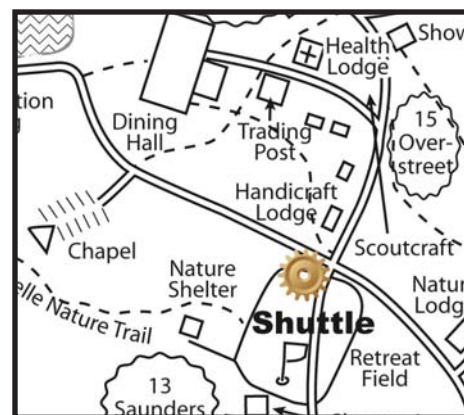
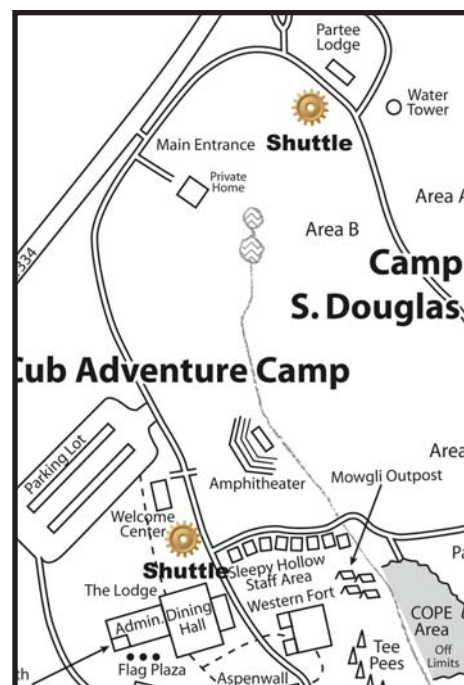
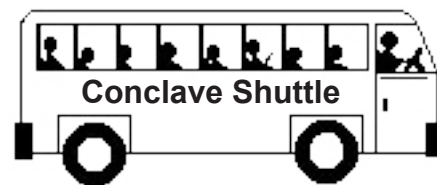

Athletics: Events and Times

This year, there are eight events in which lodges may compete athletically, and most events' entrants are divided into age groups. Competition begins with the cross country race at 11:50 AM at the CAC Dining Hall, and each lodge may enter as many runners as they wish.

After a lunch break, the games resume with a single-elimination volleyball tournament. As lodges are eliminated, they are assigned numbers with 6 going to the first to exit, 5 going to the next lodge to be eliminated, and continuing thusly until 1 is assigned to the champions. These numbers determine when these lodges will compete in other sporting events (see table, below).

All of these remaining events will take place on the CAC Sportsmanship Field with the exception of the obstacle course which is scheduled to be constructed around the CAC Mine Shaft. The obstacle course is a timed event in which ten lodge members will go through the course in a relay. The lodge with the quickest time will win. The events will close with a 1250 pounds per team tug of war, but just prior to this is the judging for the "Mystery Competition."

This year, a mystery competition has been added where the lodges are unaware of the competition until after they arrive at the conclave. At the Council of Chiefs meeting, each lodge chief was given a packet containing a bowstring, assorted feathers, and some epoxy. The challenge is to build a bow and arrow without fletching tools and use the bow to shoot the arrow. Prior to the tug of war, the lodge chiefs will test their lodge's bow and arrow set, and the lodge chief whose arrow goes the furthest wins this event for his lodge.

Rules to all events will be provided to lodge chiefs at 8:45 AM by the CAC Flag Plaza, and recall that participants and observers will receive marks towards their participation awards. 🏹
